

Guest Speaker: Edlund Kent Brown

Edlund Kent-Brown, Officer in Charge (OIC) Paramedic at the Kawana Ambulance Station, gave us a thorough insight in the workings of the Queensland Ambulance Service, a Department of Health's here on the Sunshine



They respond to about 800 cases a month including emergency calls, car accidents, etc. Edlund pointed out just how the ambulance service works: many people think that you can go to the station and find an ambulance waiting for you. This is not so. They could all be out on calls and potentially not at station. You should make the 000 call. QAS Communications Centre is in Maroochydore, the call taker will asked which service you require: Police, Fire or Ambulance. If you indicate, you want an ambulance further details will be taken.

Once you have answered the question "where are you situated?" the closest ambulance is on its way to your place. There are several questions from the Dispatcher. The answers give the paramedics the heads up on what to expect and also prioritise the call. For instance, a cut finger will be below a heart attack victim.

When you are out for a walk it is imperative you have a clear idea of where you are to guide the ambulance to your position. Edlund pointed out that if you are using your mobile phone, the registered address will come up NOT your current position. Only the Police service can identify your physical location from the mobile call number. With regard to CPR Edlund pointed out that around 75% of cases of heart attack occurred at the home not out on the road. If you know CPR and start that work on the patient the final outcome will be far better for them. In answer to the question of what: is the current timing for compressions, Edlund said that 30 compressions to two breaths. You can choose not do the breath with 'mouth to mouth' as the compressions will get passive airflow into lungs. This is better than nothing. He said that if you are on your own call 000 first then start the compressions. If there are two of you one starts the compressions while the other makes the call. He added that it was a very tiring job! He also suggested that the Ambulance Service could come to the Club and hold an interactive session. This idea was enthusiastically received!

Edlund reinforced the urgency of getting the Service as soon as possible if there is any evidence of chest pain and medical emergencies. This could indicate any number of problems - heartburn, indigestion, etc., but if it proves to be a heart attack then the sooner the medication is given, the problem identified and the Cardiac Surgeon notified, the better. If you live on your own and have a key lock outside, it is suggested that you notify the operator of the code so that the paramedics can gain entry to your premises. You can register this number with the Ambulance Service.

Paramedic qualification is a three-year degree course at University followed by a sixmonth internship with the Service.

The subject of drugs and overdosing on drugs was brought up. The paramedics have some antidotes on board. But they do have the appropriate drugs to sedate the patient to prevent them from hurting themselves and others around them.

TV programmes got a mention with Edlund confirming that most programmes do represent the real thing though there is, of course, a limit to the worse cases. It is a good indication of just what paramedics do on the job from birth of babies, vehicle accidents and injuries while exercising outdoors.

Armchair Travel - Anna Firmin

Myths, Mysteries and Memories of Dauan Island. Judy White

Dauan Island is one of the smallest of the seventeen inhabited islands of the Torres Strait group of islands, closer to Papua New Guinea than the Australian mainland. It is not a tropical tourist destination but an island that has a rich cultural and historical story to tell. I undertook the journey to visit my daughter, a Remote Area Nurse, who was managing the tiny but very busy clinic that provide health care to the 150 Torres Strait Islanders who call Dauan home. To get there took two days of travel, involving smaller and smaller aircraft and a thirty minute trip in a long boat from nearby Saibai Island. The people are related to the Melanesians from nearby Papua and, as the boys like to say, were descendants of head hunters in the not so long ago past. The geology of the island makes it unique amongst the 271 islands of the Torres Strait. It has three rocky hilltops and a narrow north facing beachfront strip on which the village is located. It is the northern most extent of the Great Dividing Range. I spent much of the first two weeks there teaching at the local school, 34 students if they all turned up, as they were short a teacher at that time. This was a wonderful experience as the children were so open and friendly and anxious to teach me about their island. There were many protocols to be observed while on the island, photography, dress, manner of greeting and observing cultural traditions, which provided no encumbrance to interaction with the people. My daughter and I had done a great deal of research into the myths of the island and sought out these stories about the spiritual life that existed in the caves and the beach and on the mountain tops. While strongly Christian in faith, these spirits are still an integral part of the people's belief system. Dauan has one of the very few rock art sites found so far in the Torres Strait. While only approx. 1600 years old, new by the standards of mainland rock art sites, the stories of massacres and destruction that define the reason for the art to be there are quite fascinating! As is the mystery of the unmarked grave of two priests in the church grounds! I have many memories of this unique destination and am intent on returning - in next year's dry season!!!
